All of the selections offered are integral to the stories Historic Columbia tell on our 14 acres of public grounds and gardens. Most of these plants are rare or not offered elsewhere. **Each plant is individually priced.**



Why do we plant in the fall?

Fall is the optimal time for planting perennials and woody trees and shrubs, especially in warmer climates like Columbia, zone 8b. The cooler weather reduces stress on the plants, and the soil is still warm, promoting root growth. By the time winter arrives, the plants will have developed enough roots to survive the cold and thrive in the spring. In zone 8b, fall planting is especially helpful because it allows perennials to settle in without the pressure of summer heat.

"Blue Star"

In late spring or early summer, the stems are topped with clusters of star-shaped blue flowers. The foliage is pretty all summer long and has a beautiful yellow fall color. This plant can tolerate well-draining soil to boggy wet conditions and in full sun to part shade. The light texture of the narrow foliage creates great contrast in the garden and is a great pollinator for an array of insects.



With gentle hands and meticulous care, the Historic Columbia grounds team use this beautiful and functional space to propagate plants into nutrient-rich soil, labeling each tray with the plant variety.

Hymenocallis caribaea 'Tropical Giant'

"Spider Lily"

This old garden hybrid can often be found in abandoned home sites in the South. Spider lilies have glossy green, amaryllis-like foliage and form impressive clumps that can tolerate drought or wet conditions. Make sure this plant has plenty of space to spread out and show off its sweetly fragrant, white spider-like flowers in the summer. The small daffodil-like cup is highlighted with long white extensions that resemble spider-like shapes.

"Tall Switchgrass"

This *Panicum* is called Tall Switchgrass for a very good reason. At seven feet, eight feet with blooms, it is one of the tallest of the switchgrasses. During the growing season, it has stunning blue gray foliage, which turns a deep gold color in the fall. Airy, billowy seed heads appear mid-summer and remain attractive into winter. Tall Switchgrass grows in a loose vase shape and should be allowed some space in the landscape. Plant it in masses or behind shorter grasses and perennials. As with others in the *Panicum* genus, it tolerates poor soil, dry conditions, and prefers no fertilizer or special care simply cut back in early spring. Plant it in full sun for strong growth. Panicum virgatum 'Cloud Nine' is a great native grass substitution for Miscanthus.

The trick to growing Black-eyed Susan is to give it full sun in decent soil. Once established it freely self-seeds and remains in the garden for many years. The deep yellow flowers have a very showy presence in the garden and can be spotted from a mile away. It has a long bloom time ranging from early July through Fall. Black-eyed Susan is a stiff, moderately fast growing, upright perennial in the *Asteraceae* (daisy) family. Native to the eastern United States but it has become widespread throughout North America. This *rudbeckia* can reach a height of three feet tall, forgives neglect, and has moderate drought tolerance.

Three Ways to Propagate Plants

At our semi-annual plant sales, we take pride in offering a selection of plants that thrive in our local environment. All the plants are propagated from our very own gardens, ensuring they are well-suited for our area's unique climate and conditions. Propagating plants from our gardens is not only beneficial for local adaptability but also promotes sustainable garden practices. By reducing the need for importing plants, we help minimize the environmental impact of our gardening efforts. The three propagation methods we use are **division**, **stem cuttings**, and **seed collection**.

Division is a propagation method that involves splitting a mature plant into several sections, each with its own root system. This is ideal for plants like the *Hemerocallis* 'Autumn Minaret' or other flowering perennials. By dividing these plants, we not only rejuvenate them but also multiply our stock for the sale.

Taking **stem cuttings** from parent plants and encouraging them to root is a common practice we use for many of our plants. This process takes place in the Boyd Horticultural Center (BHC) where we have a misting system that helps keep cuttings moist 24 hours a day. The *Gardenia jasminoides* 'Belmont' and the *Hylotelephium* both works well from stem cuttings.

Growing plants from seed is crucial for long term health and resilience of plant species. We carefully collect seeds from our healthiest plants. The *Callicarpa americana* is collected from seed each year and stored in the refrigerator for 3 weeks before we sow them in trays in the Boyd Horticultural Center.

Each of these propagation methods requires time, care, and expertise. Our team works tirelessly throughout the year to ensure that every plant we offer at our sale is of the highest quality.

"Mexican Bush Sage"

Velvet looking Salvia leucantha also called Mexican Bush Sage, is an herbaceous perennial native to Mexico and Central America. It is a great garden plant because of its late summer to early fall bloom time. This is not your average sage, because it does not have white florets inside the purple calyces; the florets are also purple. This is a must have for pollinator gardens or perennial flower lovers. This sage prefers well-drained soil but will tolerate some drought. It does best in full sun.

Arrowhead Plant features attractive, arrow-shaped leaves that start out solid green but can develop variegation depending on the cultivar. As it matures, its leaves become more lobed, and it can develop into a climbing vine if given support, though it is often grown as a bushy houseplant. This low-maintenance plant is popular for indoor use due to its low light adaptability and easy care. It prefers indirect light, and growth can be controlled by trimming to maintain a compact shape. Syngonium podophyllum is known for its air-purifying qualities. It thrives in well-drained soil with regular watering, though it can tolerate brief drought. Due to its vining nature, it also works well in hanging baskets or as a trailing plant.

The tough Southern Shield fern is one of our favorite Southeast US native ferns and certainly one of the most durable ferns we have. We love this plant so much we have it planted on multiple properties! This is by far the most admired plant in all the gardens. The large, light green fronds are deer-resistant and winter-deciduous.
